

TROUBLE ON THE SCENE



As part of its mission to bring hope and comfort to those experiencing tough times, The Kennek Foundation raises funds to distribute plush Trouble the Dog toys to first responders. The goal is to get Trouble plush toys into as many first responders' vehicles as possible to be there for children in times of crisis.

How It Works:

- Solicit donations from individuals and corporations to support the program using information from the kits.
- Apply for a Victim Services/Community grant to support the purchase of Trouble plush dogs for children who are victims of a crime or accident.
- Make copies of the flyers from the kits to share with potential donors.
- Create a press release about the program using the template provided to generate interest and awareness via the media.
- Support the campaign on police and fire social media.
- Share the "In Their Words" testimonial flyer with potential donors.
- Distribute the "Ally in the Community" flyer to potential donors.

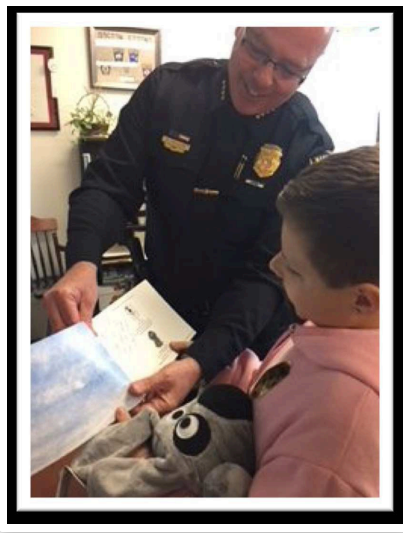

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

“Trouble on the Scene”

Q: What is the Trouble on the Scene program?

A: Trouble on the Scene is a program of The Kennek Foundation. Through the generosity of individual and corporate donors and grants, the program distributes plush Trouble the Dog toys to first responders to have on hand to distribute to distressed children at the moment of impact. Each child receives his or her very own Trouble plush as a keepsake. Officers cite Trouble’s large size and general “huggability” as being among the qualities that make this American-made toy uniquely comforting to children in crisis.

Q: Who runs the Trouble on the Scene program?

A: The Kennek Foundation launched and oversees the program. A 501(c)(3) organization, Kennek is dedicated to bringing about hope, resilience and inspiration in the lives of those most vulnerable going through tough times. Donations enable The Kennek Foundation to provide plush Trouble dogs to first responders and children’s victim witness advocates, many of whom have seen first-hand the power this simple toy has to make a real difference for a child in the midst of a traumatic event.

Q: What is Trouble the Dog?

A: Trouble is an ultra-soft keepsake toy that is 100% made in the USA. He is uniquely soft and huggable and has an uncanny ability to comfort children experiencing “trouble” in their lives -- big or small.

Q: How does this campaign work?

A: It’s simple: The Kennek Foundation accepts donations toward the purchase of plush Trouble the Dog toys and distributes them to first responders in the donors’ geographic areas of interest. The broad objective is to provide every child identified by a first responder as being in need of comfort during a time of crisis with his or her very own Trouble Dog.

Q: How can I customize the concept for my community?

A: The Kennek Foundation provides a handout in MS Word format that can be customized with your information. In addition, we provide a template press release for customization and distribution to media in your region.

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

Q: How much does Trouble cost?

A: Within the context of the Trouble on the Scene program, the cost starts at \$60 per plush Trouble Dog and a media campaign in the donor's geographic area of interest conducted by The Kennek Foundation acknowledging the donation.

Q: What inspired the idea of providing Trouble to first responders?

A: The overwhelming amount of news that suggests just how difficult life can be for so many children was the inspiration behind providing Trouble to first responders. Subsequent conversations with firefighters and police officers validated the concept and provided the motivation we needed to design a program for getting Trouble into the hands of as many children as possible at the moment of impact.

Q: Isn't Trouble just another stuffed animal?

A: Indeed, Trouble is a stuffed animal. However, as one of very few plush toys that is 100% made in America, Trouble is a keepsake-quality product. Perhaps even more importantly, he has a unique and inexplicable difference that sets him apart from the average plush toy. Maybe it's his size (he's 18"), his soft fur, his "squishiness," or those big eyes that draw children to Trouble. Whatever the reason, his power to soothe has been described as "magical."

Q: Are donations to The Kennek Foundation tax-deductible?

A: Yes! The Kennek Foundation is a 501(c)(3) charitable organization. All donations are tax-deductible.
